
I hope to see as many of our club members as possible at these events. My thanks go out to everyone who made our General Meetings so well attended.

Member Dale Whited completes journey, February 24, 1930 - May 7, 2019

Born February 24, 1930 in Eaton, Colorado, Dale was the only child of Edgar and Beulah (Farley) Whited. Sadly, when Dale was only two years old. his father passed away. This meant that Dale would end up spending a lot of time with his mother's family including aunts, uncles and cousins.

Dale passed away on Tuesday, May 7, 2019, in Broken Arrow following an almost two year battle with lung cancer. He was 89.

Dale received his education in a one-room school house and would even have his aunt as a teacher for a couple of those years. It was in the rural communities of Durango and Akron where Dale learned early on the value of hard work out on the family farm.

At the age of 17, Dale joined the United States Army. He was stationed first in Camphill, Colorado where he served as a ski instructor and also was involved in a rationing experiment. Later, he was station in San Francisco and began learning data processing. This would prove to be beneficial as upon his honorable discharge he found employment with Shell Oil as a programer.

It was in the mid 1950s while bowling with a Shell team that Dale met a young woman and coworker named Stephanie Jane Allen. Not only were the pins colliding that night, but two lives would forever be changed for the better after that meeting. The two would begin dating and ultimately joined together as one on June 6, 1956 in a Denver, Colorado wedding ceremony. To this union, three children were welcomed through the years, son — Stephen and daughters Kelly and Tracy.

A career with Shell would have the Whited family living in Colorado, Texas, Connecticut and ultimately, Tulsa, Oklahoma where Dale became the facilities manager. He retired in 1984 before the age of 60 at which time his hobby of working on cars moved front and center.

A member of the Early Ford V-8 Club of Tulsa, it was working on cars and sharing that passion with others that brought Dale joy. This passion also helped his relationship with Stephanie as he pretty well stayed out in the barn until she called him in for lunch or dinner!

The couple enjoyed spending time together and logged many miles and hours together in their motor home through the years. It would be in that motor home that they visited every state in the United States and many provinces in Canada. They also found opportunity to travel abroad and thoroughly enjoyed making those memories.

A man who has been described as stern, stoic, serious, linear, mechanical and a hard worker, Dale was one who held fast to his opinions and was a "do it now" individual. He was strong, yet a great father and a "Poppo." He wanted the best for his children and grandchildren, and he passed down to his family the lessons of hard work and also how to be "thrifty."

He was preceded in death by his wife, Stephanie, in 2015; a great-grandson, Jonah Hoos; and his parents.

Well, it was a quiet month without many questions, but I do have an update on my ongoing saga with the nonfunctioning fuel gauge. Last month I told you about a discussion I had with Rick Claybaugh about running a direct wire from the ground side of the battery to the ground screw on the fuel sending unit to ensure a

complete ground with no interruptions. Well, I tried it and unfortunately nothing changed at all! When the ignition switch is turned on, the needle starts to rise until just above the "E" and fluctuates a bit and falls back to the "E." And as soon as I start to drive the car, it quits working altogether and does not work at all until I shut the car off and turn the ignition on again. Not sure where to go from here but will keep trying. If anyone has any ideas, let me know.

I went for a drive not long ago through Owasso and out to the Port of Catoosa in the '40 Convertible. The car was running really well and then I went down a long and steep hill from Stone Canyon down to the port road. I coasted down and got to the bottom of the hill at the stop sign, but my car was no longer running! I had to push it off the road to assess the problem. Turned out, it was really flooded after that long downhill ride. I was there for about half an hour before it finally started. Does anyone have an idea why a downhill ride would flood the carburetor? Is this normal for flatheads or is something sticking open and letting too much gas into the carb? Let me know if anyone has an idea because Debi and I have signed up for the Talimena Drive this fall and if we flood every time we go down a big hill, this could make for a really long trip!

The electricity went off. All got quiet and we went back to bed, waking next morning with rest of Sapulpa to see how much damage was don. Although a utility pole with transformer scored a direct hit on my vintage LoneStar boat project and trees were down and damaged, we still feel fortunate. 

#2) Driving to Langley, Okla. via Route 66. From Tulsa follow I-44 East to Catoosa. Take Route 66 North through Claremore to Foyil. Head East on Hwy 28A towards Adair. Follow 28A/28 all the way into Langley. (Directions from Langley to their house = below item #4).

#3) Driving to Langley via the turnpike. From Tulsa follow I-44 Will Rogers Turnpike East toward Joplin. Take the Adair/South Grand Lake Exit Hwy 28. Turn left after getting off the turnpike. Go East toward Adair. Follow Hwy 28 all the way to Langley. (Directions from Langley to their house = below item #4).

#4) At the 28/82 junction turn right go about ¾ miles. Turn left on Hwy 28 toward Disney & Pensacola Dam. The GRDA ECO Center will be on the left. About ¼ mile turn right on Main Street toward Langley. Go straight ahead to STOP sign at River Road. Turn left on River Road and follow it about 3 blocks to Vinita St. Go left 1 block —" our house is the white one on the corner with large deck.
